


Fall 2022

Every 16 minutes a life is lost due to a car crash. It is crucial that safe driving occurs as soon as one sits behind the wheel.

According to The National Highway Traffic Administration (NHTSA), every minute of the day a car accident occurs. Even though not all of these accidents are fatal this statistic is still too high to ignore. It is important to stress how crucial it is for individuals behind the wheel to avoid distracted driving. Distracted driving can be anything from eating while driving to being intoxicated behind the wheel. According to the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), there are many methods an individual can follow to engage in safe driving. For example, the DMV states that you should always wear your seat belt, try not to drive at dusk or dawn when you cannot see as well, and never drive after the consumption of alcohol or drugs, and also read the labels on over-the-counter medications - these medications can also affect your ability to drive.

# Looking for a fun Thanksgiving Cookie Recipe? You found it!!

# Turkey Cookies Recipe

#### Ingredients:

- 2/3 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 large egg
- 4 teaspoons milk
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

# For the Decoration:

- 1/4 cup vanilla frosting
- Orange food coloring, as needed
- 12 miniature peanut butter cups
- 80 pieces candy corn
- 24 piece candy eyes
- 1 roll fruit leather, cut into small strips



#### Directions:

- 1. Gather ingredients and preheat the oven to 375 F. Beat the butter and sugar together in the bowl and mix until thoroughly combined.
- 2. Next, beat in the eggs and vanilla extract until fluffy then proceed to mixing in the milk.
- 3. Whisk together the dry ingredients in a separate bowl and add them to the other mixture. Blend together until all of the dry ingredients are incorporated.
- 4. Form the dough into golf-sized balls. Place them on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Bake in the oven for about 8 minutes.

Remove them from the oven and flatten the tops with a drinking glass with a circle bottom immediately after taking them out of the oven.



## **Decorating the Cookies:**

- 1. Gather ingredients and stir the food coloring into the frosting until desired color is reached. Place the frosting in a plastic bag and cut off the corner to create a small hole.
- 2. Add a small amount of frosting to the back of the peanut butter cup. Place it on the center of the cookie. Repeat with all cookies.
- 3. Squeeze a small amount of frosting onto the back of a candy corn. Place it above the peanut butter cup so that the white point is touching it, repeat until you have 5 candy corns above the peanut butter cup and it looks like a bunch of feathers.
- 4. Cut the candy corn and use the orange part for the turkey's "beak". Place it in the center of the peanut butter cup. Place edible candy eyes above it and roll the strips of fruit candy to create the waddle. Add tiny feet underneath the peanut butter cup using your frosting.

# **Class Outside of the Classroom**


• Golub Field trip with Mr. Knagg's Economics class
