How come those that believe never practice what they preach?


Those who claim to love all they really do is spread hate.

The many effects of climate change are increasingly damaging our environment. One example of this is the deterioration of Florida's coral reefs.

To begin, coral reefs are one of the most important parts of the oceanic ecosystem. The reefs provide a habitat for many marine animals, like crabs, fish, sea turtles, oysters, sharks, and clams. The United States Environmental Protection Agency found that healthy coral reefs also provide various tourism opportunities, new medicines to help treat diseases, and lastly help protect coastal infrastructure from tsunamis and hurricanes by reducing the impact of the storms.

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, "increased greenhouse gasses from human activities result in climate change and ocean acidification". One such human activity is the burning of fossil fuels for heat and energy. Due to worsening climate change, the temperatures of the oceans are rising, causing coral bleaching and disease outbreaks. Without these corals, the ocean's most vibrant ecosystems will collapse, along with all of the benefits that coral reefs provide.

Some believe that plants and animals are able to adapt to climate change, therefore this issue does not need to be taken seriously. However, because human-caused climate change is increasing so rapidly, animals and plants are unable to adapt quickly enough. Fragile species like coral reefs are especially vulnerable to temperature changes, seeing how coral-bleaching is becoming more and more prone.

Moving forward, there are many actions that can be taken to help reduce the impact of climate change on coral reefs. For example, simply spreading the word can inform the public of the climate crisis and help people realize the impact they are having on the environment. Also, being aware of the amount of fossil fuels we burn can help reduce climate change. Switching to LED lights, lowering our heating and cooling, and hanging our clothes to dry are some simple ways to become more environmentally friendly. 
