2026 Capital Project SEQRA: *Recommended Motion:* “WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Schalmont Central School District (“Board”) is proposing to Undertake a project on various sites operated by the Board including the Middle/High School, Jefferson Elementary School, Woestina Elementary School, Bus Maintenance Garage, and Transportation Building including associated work on fields adjacent to the school buildings, and various buildings and grounds (collectively “School District Buildings and Sites”) consisting of the following improvements generally consisting of the following: Middle/High School/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, sidewalk replacement and repairs, repairing and resurfacing tennis courts and associated items; upgrading and installing stadium lighting; repairing building foundation, repair and/or replace exterior columns; repair concrete slab issues near cafeteria; repair and renovate the roof including providing coating, secondary drainage and improvements, and painting; replacement of roofs; repair and replacement of plumbing; repair of main electrical system; repair and/or replacement of auditorium flooring and seating; and other associated work; Jefferson Elementary School/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, reconstruct parking lots; reconstruct sidewalks; repair and renovate the roof including providing coating, secondary drainage and improvements, and painting; replacement of roof top units, building additions and renovations to accommodate additional grades and class sections; creation of a bus loop and driveway

extension; playground installation; and other associated work; Woestina Elementary School/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, repoint/repair work on masonry at chimney; and associated work; Bus Maintenance Garage/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, demolition of existing bus repair garage; demolition of existing fuel station; and other associated work; Transportation Building/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, building addition, renovations, and associated site work to accommodate bus maintenance and building and grounds facilities; and other associated work; and, any associated work all at of the above sites (“the Proposed Action” or “Project”). WHEREAS, the State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”) and the regulations thereunder require the Board to undertake a review of the potential environmental impacts, if any, associated with the Project before approving same; and, WHEREAS, this Project is a Type I action within the meaning of SEQRA; and, WHEREAS, a Full Environmental Assessment Form has been prepared by the Districts Architect/Engineer and reviewed by the Board in connection with the Project; and, WHEREAS, the Board has elected to proceed with a coordinated review under 6 NYCRR Section 617.6; and, WHEREAS, the Full Environmental Assessment Form (Part 1) was transmitted to the New York State Education Department (NYSED), and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYDEC), all together with notification of the Board’s desire to act as lead agency with respect to the environmental review of the Project, on or about June 23, 2026, all of which are or may be involved agencies; and WHEREAS, the Full Environmental Assessment Form (Part 1) was also transmitted to the Town of Rotterdam, Schenectady County Department of Engineering and Public Works, and Schenectady County Department of Economic Development and Planning, as interested agencies, on or about June 23, 2026; and, WHEREAS, the above involved agencies have either consented to the Board acting as lead agency with respect to the environmental review of the Project, or have failed to respond within thirty days of such notice; and, WHEREAS, 6 NYCRR Section 617.7 requires a lead agency to issue a written determination of significance with respect to any proposed Type I action; and, WHEREAS, some of the above school buildings/sites are separated geographically with no environmental impacts between them for SEQRA determination purposes with the only connection being that the entire Project is subject to a single funding source and vote by the residents of the School District. Therefore, the Board will consider this as one single resolution to negate any perception of segmentation; and, WHEREAS, the Board has carefully considered the nature and scope of the Project, as set forth in the Full Environmental Assessment Form (Parts 1, 2, and 3) prepared by the Board’s Architect/Engineer with respect to such action indicating that the Project will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment, and makes the following determinations:

1. The proposed action involves work on various sites operated by the Board including the following: Middle/High School/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, sidewalk replacement and repairs, repairing and resurfacing tennis courts and associated items; upgrading and installing stadium lighting; repairing building foundation, repair and/or replace exterior columns; repair concrete slab issues near cafeteria; repair and renovate the roof including providing coating, secondary drainage and improvements, and painting; replacement of roofs; repair and replacement of plumbing; repair of main electrical system; repair and/or replacement of auditorium flooring and seating; and other associated work; Jefferson Elementary School/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, reconstruct parking lots; reconstruct sidewalks; repair and renovate the roof including providing coating, secondary drainage and improvements, and painting; replacement of roof top units, building additions and renovations to accommodate additional grades and class sections; creation of a bus loop and driveway extension; playground installation; and other associated work; Woestina Elementary School / Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, repoint/repair work on masonry at chimney; and associated work; Bus Maintenance Garage / Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, demolition of existing bus repair garage; demolition of existing fuel station; and other associated work; Transportation Building/Site: Site and facility improvements including, but not limited to, building addition, renovations, and associated site work to accommodate

bus maintenance and building and grounds facilities; and other associated work; and, any associated work all at of the above sites (“the Proposed Action” or “Project”). 2. The Project is classified under SEQRA as a Type I action. 3. Upon consideration of the action, review of the Full Environmental Assessment Forms, the criteria contained in 6 NYCRR § 617.7(c), and all other supporting information; the Board identifies the following relevant areas of environmental concern, as set forth hereafter, and analyzes whether the proposed action may have a significant adverse impact on the environment. 4. The Project does not involve, and therefore will not result in, any substantial adverse change or impact on land or geological features. While the Project will affect one or more of these areas, any impact will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantial adverse impact. 5. The Project does not involve, and therefore, will not result in, any substantial adverse change in existing air quality, ground or surface water quality or quantity, traffic or noise levels, or a substantial increase in solid waste production, or a substantial increase in potential for erosion, flooding, leaching, or drainage problems. While the Project will affect one or more wetlands, ground, or other surface water, or noise and light levels, any impact will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantial adverse impact. 6. The Project does not involve, and therefore will not result in, the removal or destruction of large quantities of vegetation or fauna, a substantial interference with the movement of any resident or migratory fish or wildlife species, impacts on any significant habitat area, substantial adverse impacts on a threatened or endangered species of animal or plant, or the habitat thereof, or other significant adverse impacts to nature resources. Any impact to plants or animals will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantial adverse impact. 7. The Project does not involve, and therefore will not result in, any impact on Agricultural Resources. 8. The Project does not involve, and therefore will not result in, any impact on Aesthetic Resources. 9. The Project is not located within a designated Critical Environmental Area. 10. The Project will not create a material conflict with the community’s current plans or goals as officially approved or adopted. 11. The Project will not result in the impairment of the character or quality of any important historical, archeological, or aesthetic resources, or of existing community or neighborhood character. While the Project may affect one or more of these areas, any impact will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantive adverse impact. 12. The Project will not create an impact on or material conflict with existing transportation systems. 13. The Project will not result in any major, adverse, change in the use of either the quantity or type of energy noise, odor, or light. While the Project may affect one or more of these areas, any impact will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantive adverse impact. 14. The Project will not result in the creation of a hazard to human health. Any impact on human health will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantial adverse impact. 15. The Project does not involve, and therefore will not result in, a substantial change in the use, or intensity of use, of land including agricultural, open space, or recreational resources, or in its capacity to support such uses. While the Project may affect one or more of these areas, any impact will be non-existent or small in nature, not arising to a substantive adverse impact. 16. The Project will not result in the encouragement or attraction of a large number of people to the site as compared to the number of people that would come absent from the action. 17. The Project will not result in a material demand for other actions, will not result in changes to two or more elements of the environment which together would result in a substantial adverse impact, and will not cumulatively result in a substantial adverse impact when considered with any related actions. 18. The Project will not result in changes to two or more elements of the environment, no one of which has a significant impact on the environment, but when considered together result in a substantial adverse impact on the environment. 19. The Project does not involve two or more related actions undertaken, funded or approved by the District, none of which has or would have a significant impact on the environment, but when considered together cumulatively would meet one or more of the criteria in 6 NYCRR 617.7(c) and result in a substantial adverse impact on the environment. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board finds and concludes that the Project is a Type I action within the meaning of 6 NYCRR 617.2(a); and it is further RESOLVED that the Board

hereby declares itself lead agency with respect to the environmental review of the Project; and it is further RESOLVED, that upon consideration of the foregoing, pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.7, the Board finds and concludes that the Project will not result in any significant adverse impacts to the environment and that no Environmental Impact Statement (“EIS”) is required for this Project; and it is further RESOLVED, that the Board hereby issues a Negative Declaration with respect to the Project. RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution shall be sent to any involved or Interested agencies.”

2026 Capital Project Proposition: *Recommended Motion:* “BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SCHALMONT CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT AT ROTTERDAM (the “School District”) that a special meeting of the qualified voters of said School District be and the same is hereby called to be held at the High School Gym Foyer, 1 Sabre Drive, Schenectady, New York on Thursday, October 15, 2026 between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. prevailing time (the “Special Vote”) for the purpose of voting on the following proposition: Shall the Board of Education of the Schalmont Central School District at Rotterdam be authorized to (1) construct additions to, reconstruct, renovate, improve and demolish various School District buildings, facilities and sites, acquire original furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus required for the purpose for which such buildings, facilities and sites are to be used and pay incidental costs related thereto, at a maximum estimated cost of not to exceed \$54,329,883, (2) expend such sum for such purposes, including the expenditure of \$7,000,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund, (3) levy the necessary tax therefore, to be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education in accordance with Section 416 of the Education Law, taking into account State aid received and the amount expended from the Capital Reserve Fund, and (4) in anticipation of the collection of such tax, issue bonds and notes at one time or from time to time in the principal amount not to exceed \$47,329,883, and levy a tax to pay the interest on said obligations when due? BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the vote shall be by machine or paper ballot, as well as by absentee ballot, early mail ballot and military ballot. The hours during which the polls shall be kept open shall be from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. prevailing time or for as long thereafter as necessary to enable qualified voters who are in the polling place at 9:00 p.m. to cast their ballots. Any person shall be entitled to vote who is: (a) a citizen of the United States, (b) eighteen years of age and (c) a resident within the District for a period of thirty days next preceding the October 15, 2026 vote. The School District may require all persons offering to vote to provide one form of proof of residency pursuant to Education Law section 2018-c. Such form may include a driver’s license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill, or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the School District may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name and address; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that applications for early mail and absentee ballots will be obtainable and accepted by the District Clerk beginning September 21, 2026; completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the Special Vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter (October 8, 2026), or the day before the Special Vote, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter (October 15, 2026). Early mail and absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 PM, prevailing time, on October 15, 2026. A list of persons to whom early mail and absentee ballots are issued will be available for inspection to qualified voters of the District in the office of the District Clerk during each of the five (5) days prior to the day of the Special Vote, except Saturday (October 10, 2026) and Sunday (October 11, 2026), between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Education Law makes special provisions for absentee voting by “permanently disabled” voters of the District and any questions regarding these rights should be directed to the Clerk of the Board; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Education Law also makes special provisions for absentee voting for “military” voters of the District. Specifically, the law provides a unique procedure for “military ballots”

in school district votes. Whereas early mail and absentee ballot applications and early mail and absentee ballots must be received by the voter by mail or in person, a military voter may elect to receive their absentee ballot application and absentee ballot by mail, email or facsimile. The military voter must, however, return their original military ballot application and military ballot by mail or in person. The Clerk of the Board shall transmit the military voter’s military ballot in accordance with the military voter’s preferred method of transmission not later than twenty-five (25) days before the vote. The Clerk of the Board must then receive the military voter’s military ballot by mail or in person not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the vote; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the District Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to publish a notice of such meeting in two newspapers of general circulation within the School District, four (4) times within the seven (7) weeks next preceding such School District meeting, the first publication to be at least forty-five (45) days prior to the date of the meeting; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution takes effect immediately upon its adoption.”
